THE KNOCK AT THE DOOR

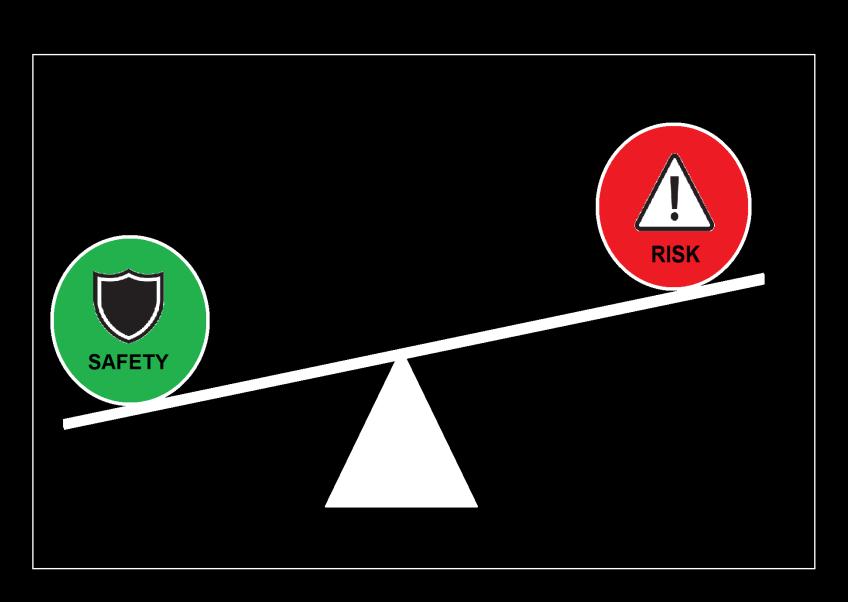
• First home visit = shouting, threats, and fear.

"They never prepared us for this in class."

Not isolated → systemic challenge

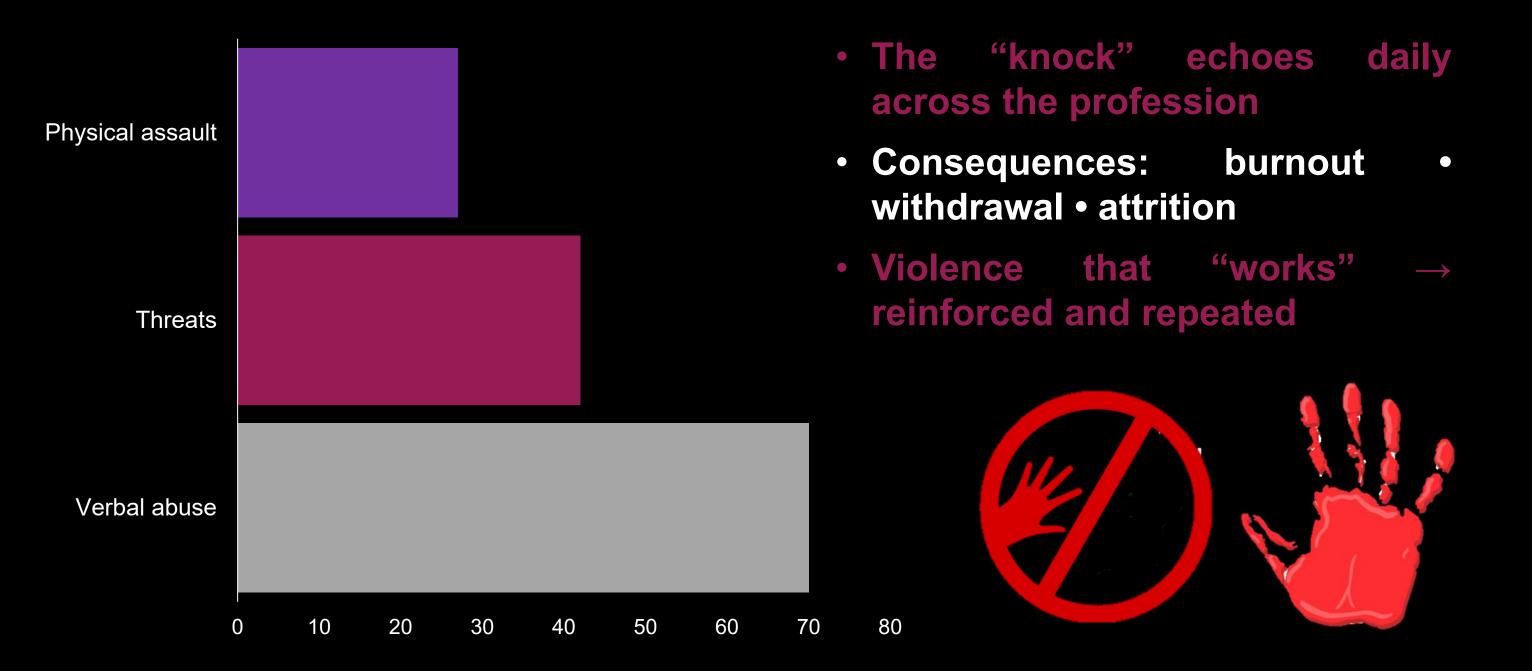


WHY THE KNOCK MATTERS

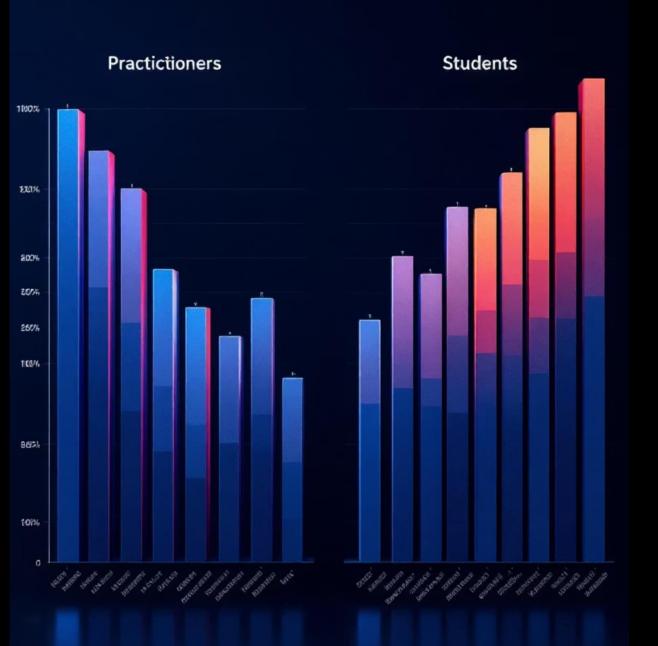


- Systemic, global issue in social work
- Risks → undermine wellbeing & retention
- Organisational culture eroded
- Curricula silent on safety

VIOLENCE IN PRACTICE



VIOLENCE IN TRAINING



- Exposure begins early in training
- Students face risks \rightarrow readiness & wellbeing harmed
- They often model supervisors' coping or lack thereof
- Cycles of violence reinforced in the profession

Prevalence Among Students:

- 81% report non-physical aggression
- 56% experience physical aggression
- 40% encounter sexual harassment

Impact:

- Increased anxiety
- Disengagement from studies
- Feelings of being unsupported

CURRICULUM GAP

- Violence is pervasive, yet safety training is omitted
- Most programmes leave a critical void in preparation

UNPREPARED GRADUATES

A staggering 94% of students report feeling unprepared to manage aggression effectively after completing their studies.

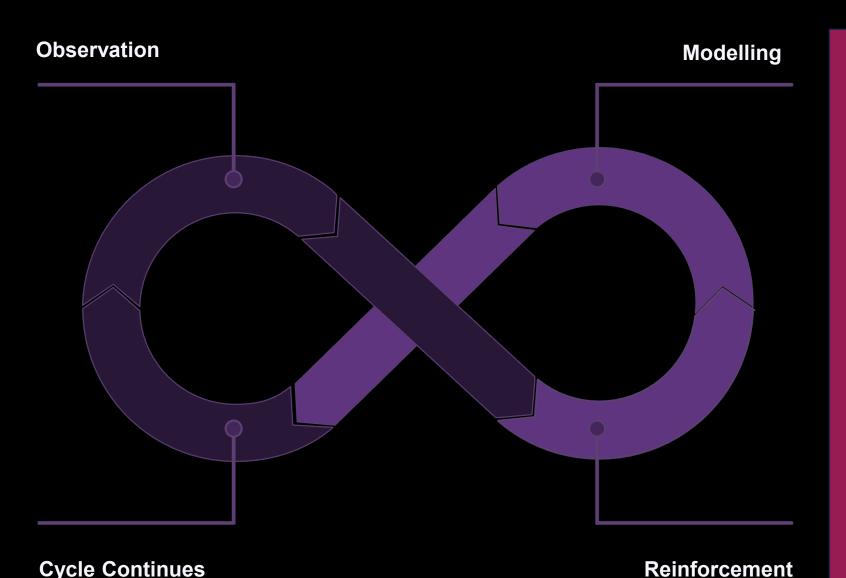
IMPLICIT LESSON

This omission sends an implicit message to future practitioners: "safety is secondary," reinforcing a culture of silence rather than proactive preparedness.

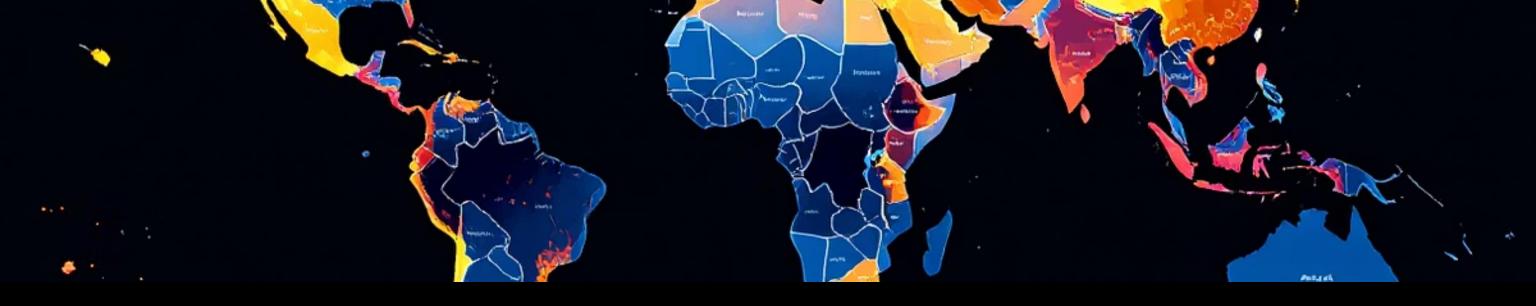
- The "knock" goes unanswered in the classroom
- Silence in curricula reinforces silence in practice



MAKING SENSE OF THE CYCLE: SOCIAL LEARNING THEORY



- The "knock" repeats across generations (Bandura)
- Clients, practitioners & students shape one another
- Observed → absorbed →
 Reinforced → repeated → Modelled
 → copied
- SLT = bridge between data and daily practice



RESEARCH PATTERNS

- 22 studies (1996–2023) → strong evidence base
- Geographical bias: mostly USA, Israel, Slovakia
- Minimal research in Africa & Latin America
- Scholarship spikes after tragedies, then fades
- Research often reactive → silence reinforced

RETHINKING THE KNOCK: SIMULATION & INNOVATION

- Prepares students for practice realities
- Safe spaces to observe, model, and rehearse
- Builds confidence & appropriate responses before the field



Advanced Tools

Utilizing VR, escape rooms, and Al avatars creates immersive learning environments



Enhanced Outcomes

These simulations boost student confidence, refine practical skills, and increase overall readiness for real-world scenarios.



Addressing Gaps

While effective, ongoing work is needed to ensure equity in access and mitigate self-report biases in assessments.

ANSWERING THE KNOCK: FRAMEWORK FOR RESPONSIVE CURRICULA

- Comprehensive model for responsive teaching
- Integrates knowledge + resilience
- Turns curriculum silence into proactive preparation
- Equips social workers for challenges at the door



Trauma-Informed

Address the profound impact of violence on both clients and practitioners.

Core Competence

Elevate safety from an elective topic to a fundamental, embedded core competence.

SLT-Grounded

Explicitly integrate Social Learning Theory to model and reinforce safe practices.

Simulation-Integrated

Provide practical, safe environments to practice deescalation and response skills.

Prepared. Equipped. Supported.

- Violence will always be a part of social work.

What is the project about?

The Wellness Wardens Initiative is a multi-phased participatory research project, aimed at strengthening the safety, well-being, and professional capacity of social service professionals. Prompted by rising concerns around client-perpetrated violence and systemic neglect, the project investigates safety across personal, organisational, governmental, and academic domains. The initiative is registered as a community engagement project at North-West University and designed to host multiple subprojects by students, faculty, and collaborators over time. Participatory Action Research (PAR) guides the methodological approach, with lived experience and co-ownership at its core.
